Main points raised and positions expressed:	<p><i>OpenAI expresses appreciation about the EU regulatory framework which is considered to provide clarity and predictability. They promote the existing levels of equality and safety standards to also guide the framework for AI.</i></p> <p><i>European youth safety blueprint for AI chatbots: Open AI advocates for AI literacy, they highlight the importance of young generations to know how to use it but also to have knowledge about what they interact with and how to use it safely. They also refer to a number of possible safeguards for minors that could be or are built in existing models. OpenAI also explains how they try to ensure that the protective measures they put in place work effectively.</i></p> <p><i>AI in contracting: OpenAI, on the one hand, mentions contracting between AI and human counterparts (AI agents), they see this as a developing area and advocate to apply same legal standards and see if existing legal frameworks need adaption. On the other hand, they mention another increasingly relevant area that warrants consideration, namely where the use of AI moves from conversation to action (eg AI executing purchases or concluding contracts on behalf of the user).</i></p>
