Characters used for rhotacization

These small forms are used as non-syllabic suffixes representing the linguistic phenomenon known in Chinese as érhuà (rhotacization).

16FF3 𠃐 CHINESE SMALL TRADITIONAL ER

Characters used for Cantonese music

These tempo marks constitute a set with 3026.

16FF4 𠃒 YANGQIN SIGN SLOW ONE BEAT

→ 3026 𠃒 hangzhou numeral six

16FF5 𠃔 YANGQIN SIGN SLOW THREE HALF BEATS

16FF6 𠃖 YANGQIN SIGN SLOW TWO BEATS
