International agreements

In this section, you can find instruments produced by the EU in the exercise of its external competences, including:

- agreements concluded jointly by the Member States and the European Union (or former European Communities - EC, EEC, ECSC) and/or the European Atomic Energy Community with non-EU countries or with international organisations in areas where the EU and the Member States share competence ('mixed' agreements);
- bilateral and multilateral agreements concluded by the European Union (or former European Communities - EC, EEC, ECSC) and/or the European Atomic Energy Community with non-EU countries or with international organisations in areas where the EU can act alone ('EU exclusive competence');
- acts of bodies created by such international agreements.

You will find these EU international agreements accompanied by a rich legal analysis and links to related information (validity of the act, dates of effect, links with other documents and much more).

How to search in this section

The left-hand side of this page gives access to several search tools.

- Search in international agreements redirects to an advanced search form that offers many options. Searches will be performed only within the remit of the 'International agreements' section.
- The Directory of international agreements contains all the documents of this section organised in 20 main domains and several subdomains.
- The Recently published search gives access to all the documents published in this section in the last 14 days.

EU international agreements are legally binding agreements between the European Union and one or more non-EU countries or international organisations. They may be concluded when the Treaties so provide or when the conclusion of an agreement: (i) is necessary to achieve, within the framework of the EU's policies, one of the objectives referred to in the Treaties; (ii) is provided for in a legally binding EU act; or (iii) is likely to affect common rules or alter their scope.

The <u>EU's external action</u> is set out in Title V of the Treaty on the European Union and in Part 5 of the Treaty on the Functioning of the European Union (TFEU). The procedure for negotiating and adopting <u>international agreements</u> is set out in Articles <u>207</u> and <u>218</u> of the TFEU for the common commercial policy and for the other external action areas, respectively.
