Justice, freedom and security



The creation of the area of freedom, security and justice derives from Title V of the Treaty on the Functioning of the European Union (Articles 67–89). The area was created to ensure the absence of <u>border control</u> at internal borders while offering a high level of protection to citizens. According to Article <u>3</u> of the Treaty on European Union, which sets out the objectives of the <u>European Union</u> (EU), the EU offers its citizens an <u>area</u> of freedom, security and justice without internal frontiers.

The absence of border control is ensured in conjunction with appropriate measures respecting external border control, <u>asylum, immigration</u> and preventing and combating crime, while also including judicial cooperation in civil and criminal matters and police cooperation.
